
So far, this online tool has proved to be very popular with over 500 people viewing the site in the first 5

## Panmure customers tell it like it is

Survey results out now

the Panmure Business Association conducted the Panmure Customer Survey throughout the month of September 2018. This was to gauge the perceptions of the public about their visit to Panmure. Interviews were conducted throughout the town centre on several different days at varying times, and with all age groups.

#### Key findings were:

62% drove into Panmure, 28% walked, 10%

arrived by bus and 0% by train

- 32% visited Panmure daily, 31% weekly, 7% for work, 14% monthly and 15% hardly ever
- The most popular improvements suggested were; more variety of shops, better food shops, supermarket, more modern town, more for youth and kids, better night life, better shelter, lighting and seating in shade, more events and festivals. These were also the main factors that would make

them visit Panmure more often.

• Their top 5 reasons for visiting Panmure:

Work 24%

Food 14%


Hair & Beauty 13%

Healthcare 8%



## Panmure's recent history



he photo above shows the Panmure Roundabout before the installation of the Panmure Sign in 1994.

In 1991, the streetscape of the town centre was having a massive upgrade and the Panmure Commercial Association wanted something at the entrance to the main street that would enhance the visual uniqueness of the Panmure shopping centre as well as strengthen visitors' 'sense of arrival'. The design reflected the theme of space, stars and atoms to acknowledge the tremendous growth of the Panmure Township between the late 1940's to the 1960's.

Next year, due to the AMETI Eastern Busway Project, the roundabout will become a signalised intersection that will dramatically improve the safety and convenience for pedestrians wishing to access the Panmure Train and Bus Station.
